DECLARATION OF CONSCIENCE

Unitarian Universalists are a justice seeking people who believe in pluralism and who, individually and as an association, have worked hard over the years to help achieve some of the victories that have taken place in civil rights, women's rights, LGBTQ rights, and environmental justice. Knowing there is still so much work to be done, the new shift in government has raised significant anxiety over the possibility that many of those advances are in jeopardy.

At our best, however, Unitarian Universalists are not handwringers or complainers. Facing a new reality, we are urged to continue to match our values to our actions and live out our faith in the real world every day each according to our own understanding and ability. This is the challenge that the leaders of our Association have given us in the Declaration of Conscience that I read during the January 22 service and which is reprinted here:

“At this extraordinary time in our nation’s history, we are called to affirm our profound commitment to the fundamental principles of justice, equity and compassion, to truth and core values of American society.

In the face of looming threats to immigrants, Muslims, people of color, and the LGBTQ community and the rise of hate speech, harassment and hate crimes, we affirm our belief in the inherent worth and dignity of every person.

In opposition to any steps to undermine the right of every citizen to vote or to turn back advances in access to health care and reproductive rights, we affirm our commitment to justice and compassion in human relations.

And against actions to weaken or eliminate initiatives to address the threat of climate change – actions that would threaten not only our country but the entire planet – we affirm our unyielding commitment to protect the interdependent web of all existence.

We will oppose any and all unjust government actions to deport, register, discriminate, or despoil.

As people of conscience, we declare our commitment to translate our values into action as we stand on the side of love with the most vulnerable among us.

We welcome and invite all to join in this commitment for justice.

The time is now.”

May you find your place in our movement’s challenge and our congregation’s ongoing mission of building a larger community of peace, justice, and love!

In 2016, Judy worked with the Centers of Disease Control (CDC) and the Office of National Drug Control Policy to get \$1 billion in federal funding for opioid addiction treatment. President Obama subsequently invited Judy to the White House to attend the signing of that bill which provided the funds for opioid addiction treatment. A proud moment! The introduction to their film is critical. Do plan on being an "early bird" !!

Social Justice Committee News

Split the Plate: Sunday, February 19

The February Split the Plate will be for Planned Parenthood of Southwest and Central Florida. Choice is under attack and has been for the past 100 years that the organization has existed. What is particularly scary now is that the new administration is planning to stop funding Planned Parenthood's reimbursements for services rendered under Medicaid. The reality is that only three percent of Planned Parenthood's work nationally involves women who choose abortions. That means 97% of Planned Parenthood's services are for health, education and contraception for women, girls and some men. The Medicaid funds which are not grants, contrary to much popular perception, but are indeed payments for health services rendered to poor women and girls across the country, including Collier, apparently will be cut. These services include many lifesaving tests including pap smears, mammograms, other screening for women's health problems and education on safe sex and contraception options. While Planned Parenthood believes that Roe Versus Wade will be under attack through reconstituted Federal appeals courts and Supreme Court, there will be many more immediate restrictions on Choice through State legislatures' renewed efforts. The biggest attempt at a death blow to the organization, however, will be quickly cutting off reimbursements for services to poor women. Planned Parenthood has vowed after one hundred years of service to keep its doors open. To offset the cuts donations will have to be hugely increased. The Social Justice Committee and especially the Reproductive Justice Committee of our UU congregation would like to see us contribute as generously as possible to our local affiliate.

The Reproductive Justice subcommittee of Social Justice is proud to announce the special movie presentation of "TRAPPED" on Sunday, February 26, 2017 at 12:15. Discussion to follow. "TRAPPED" is an award winning documentary highlighting the medically unnecessary restrictions that abortion providers face in our work of ensuring that all people have access to a full range of reproductive health care options.

Since life under Trump will only make things worse than this film portrays, it is important to become as informed as possible. Sandwiches will be provided. The movie is 83 minutes long.

A frank discussion of Alzheimer's

Alzheimer's disease is currently incurable, but we can empower ourselves by talking together in a frank, balanced discussion about coping with the disease.

The Transitions – Aging & Dying class is planning to have several continuing sessions after the 5-week class officially wraps up on Thursday, February 9. Anyone interested in attending one or more of these continuing sessions is welcome to attend, whether they participated in the Transitions class or not.

The first follow-up sessions will take place on Thursday, February 16, when we will welcome Rev. Bill Zeckhausen and his wife, Barbara, to lead a session on Alzheimer's.

Bill is an ordained UCC minister, with a career as a diplomate with the American Association of Pastoral Counselors. He served as a licensed Pastoral Psychotherapist for 40 years in New Hampshire. Bill was diagnosed 3 years ago with Alzheimer's, and since that point he has turned much of his focus to learning more about the disease – a challenging, meaningful, positive struggle. He is eager to reach out to others with Alzheimer's and their caregivers, addressing the ongoing decline caused by this disease.

Barbara was a three-term New Hampshire Legislator. Inspired by attending the World Conference on Women in Beijing in 1995, she founded, organized, and spearheaded the New Hampshire Women's Fund, for women and girls. Her remarks will include practical tips for being a caregiver of a loved one with Alzheimer's.

Bill hopes that attendees will read three short, published articles that he has written (see Upcoming Events on UUCGN website at uunaples.org to retrieve them). It would be helpful if Bill and Barbara know your questions or experiences ahead of time so they can succeed in addressing meaningfully what is on your mind. They can be reached at:


